Joining the Celebration of Women's History Month Spotlight on Courageous Women

Though the contributions of women should rightfully be integrated throughout the year, the month of March has been designated as **Women's History Month.** Schools, museums, newscasts and articles across the nation will highlight famous women and their place in the past. We join in their celebration.

Virginia Apgar (1909-1974) was an obstetrical anesthesiologist who originally completed a residency in surgery. After being discouraged from practicing in that field, she turned to anesthesiology. Considered a leader in this field and that of teratology, Virginia is best known for her creation of the "Apgar score," which is a way to quickly assess a newborn's health immediately after birth.

Grace Murray Hopper (1906-1992) graduated with degrees in math and physics from Vassar College and joined the Navy during World War 2. She was assigned to program the Mark 1 computer and lead the team that created the first computer language compiler. This eventually led to the popular COBOL language. Grace rose to the rank of Rear Admiral before retirement.

Ida B. Wells-Barnett (1862-1931), an African American journalist and activist, led an anti-lynching crusade in the 1890s after her friend was lynched by a mob without trial. She established several civil rights organizations and is considered a founder of the NAACP. Ida took her crusades to Washington, calling upon President Woodrow Wilson to end discriminatory hiring practices in government jobs.

Okolo Rashid (1951 -) is an African American Muslim living in Jackson, Mississippi. Dismayed by the lack of inclusion of the influences by Islam on Spain in a large exhibit coming to Jackson, Okolo organized her own exhibit in just four months that drew 25,000 visitors. With the timing of 9/11, many saw the need for the exhibit to become permanent and the International Museum of Muslim Cultures (IMMC) was born.

Esther Peterson (1906-1997) was the first voice championing equal pay for equal work. Esther created the Presidential Commission on the Status of Women during the 1960s. She led the fight for truth in advertising and was the driving force for the Equal Pay Act of 1963. She created nutritional labels and "sell before" labels for food.

Ruth Mary Rogan Benerito (1916-2013) began her college career at the age of 15. Ruth went on to work in the textile industry, helping to perfect modern wrinkle free cotton known as "permanent press," which is often considered one of the greatest inventions in the 20th century. She held over 50 patents, many dealing with wash and wear fabrics. Ruth was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame in 2008.

Margaret Chase Smith (1897-1995) from the state of Maine, got her start in politics when she succeeded her husband in the House of Representatives after his death. After four terms in the House, Margaret became the first woman to be elected to both the House and the Senate, where she served an additional four terms. In 1950, she was the first member of the Senate to denounce Joseph McCarthy and his anti-Communism crusade. In 1964, Margaret ran for President of the United States and became the first woman to seek the backing of a major party, running for the Republican nomination. Spending a whopping \$335, she took her candidacy all the way to the Republican convention in San Francisco, where she came in second to Barry Goldwater.

Mary Jane Patterson (1840-1894) was the first African American woman to graduate from college when she received her B.A. from Oberlin College, the first college in the nation to grant undergraduate degrees to women. Born a slave near Raleigh, North Carolina, she escaped with her family to the north. Her father then bought their freedom and moved the family to Ohio so that all his children could attend college. Well into the 20th century, black families differed from white families in that they educated both their sons and daughters. Mary Jane went on to have an illustrious career as an educator and to serve as a mentor to the African American community.

Domestic Violence

Then ...

In 1978, AAUW-PVP obtained a grant from the AAUW Foundation to provide community education on the topic of domestic violence. At that time, knowledge about the problem was limited and very little assistance was available for victims of this type of abuse. AAUW members, under the leadership of Janet Smith, then president, and Jodie Fay, project director, provided domestic violence education to over 2,000 individuals. Education was offered at high schools, colleges and universities, to healthcare workers, law enforcement officers, and the general public. A brochure was developed and 5,000 copies were distributed to potential domestic violence victims. Work on this issue was ongoing and contributed to the 1984 creation of Rainbow Services, a domestic violence hotline, and shelter and support program located in San Pedro, California.

Today...

The problem of domestic violence is still very much with us. The Mayor of Los Angeles and L.A. Chief of Police announced recently that domestic violence reports to LAPD are up over 20%. At Rainbow Services, hotline calls are up 41% and referrals for emergency shelter are up over 50% in 2014 as compared to 2013. L.A. County and HUD are primary sources of funding to support shelters for victims of domestic violence; CA State funding has been drastically cut in recent years.

The AAUW-PVP Freedom from Fear Committee recently invited a representative from Rainbow Services to be the guest speaker at our January, 2016 Council meeting. Judy Gordon, Director of Education and Volunteers, provided an update on Rainbow Services and answered numerous questions. Rainbow Services currently operates a 24 hour hotline and has two shelters - an emergency shelter for stays of up to 60 days, and a transitional shelter where victims and their children may remain for up to one year. Counseling, case management, parenting classes, life-skills classes, and several programs for children are provided by 45 bilingual (Spanish) employees and 64 volunteers.

What WE can do now.....

- Education we can help to open doors for education at churches, synagogues, community centers, etc. Domestic violence is found even in teenagers and youth groups can benefit from education on how to build healthy relationships.
- Contributions while monetary contributions are always appreciated, there is also a great need for food, NEW towels and bed linens (all beds are twin sized), hygiene products, and gift cards (especially for stores like Target, Ralph's, Wal-Mart).
- Volunteering volunteers are given 40 hours of training and provide office support (filing, Excel work), childcare during adult support programs, assist in life-skills classes, etc. Volunteers do not have to be bilingual.
