E-Blasts

- All E-blasts must be approved by Council Chair prior to submission to E-Blast Coordinator.
- E-Blasts are utilized only for announcements and/or activities directly related to branch activities.
- E-blast must contain a subject line, a short message and attachments when appropriate.

E-Mail Lists

- There will only be one membership data base and it will be updated by the Membership Co-Chair.
- Sub-groups such Interest Groups and Committee Chairs may maintain their own list.

Coastlines

- Any member can submit information to the newsletter as long as it is pertinent, in writing and within published deadlines. Coastline editors have discretion to edit or publish any submitted material.
- Coastlines will be published on a bimonthly schedule.
- Council Chair has final approval for Coastlines prior to printing.

Calendars

- Calendar information is posted in the Coastlines Newsletter.
- A one-page calendar is e-mailed on the month Coastlines is not published.

Thanks to the initial leadership of our branch, after a couple of years of hard work by over 50 volunteers, the Palos Verdes Peninsula Village is about to open. <u>How did it all happen?</u> On Saturday morning, March 30, 2013, AAUW PVP presented a well-attended meeting in the Community Room of the Peninsula Center Library with Helen Dennis speaking on "Building Blocks for Resilience in Later Life." The eight building blocks discussed were "Community, Physical Activity, Mental Activity, Personality, Attitude, Relationships, Nutrition and Purpose."

Following the talk, several members of the branch took Helen to lunch. Someone asked "what is this Village thing we have been hearing about?" Helen wrote her next weekly column in the Daily Breeze about the Village Concept, citing the Beacon Hill Village in Boston, founded in 2002 as a new way to age with independence, dignity, purpose and engagement. Many other Villages were being formed across the country as communities learned of this concept.

The initial steering group was chaired by AAUW members Connie Davenport and Susan Wallace. They interviewed leaders of the Pasadena and Westchester villages, and searched the website of the" Village to Village Network", an association of Villages already operating, and those in process of formation.

On Saturday May 14, 2014 AAUW presented a community meeting "The Village Concept: Living Independently As We Age," again at the Library. The response was overwhelming – over 100 filled the Community room, with dozens turned away. We quickly organized two more meetings, including the speakers from Pasadena and Westchester.

We decided that perhaps Palos Verdes was an ideal place to start a Village of our own. Meetings were held inviting people to join teams for Financials and Fundraising, Governance/Administration and Operations, Needs and Resources, and Communications/Marketing and Outreach/Generate Membership. An e-mail list was developed with 400 names of those who said they were interested in the village, many in volunteering and receiving services.

A board of directors was formed with Sherry May, Helen Dennis, Britt Huff, Ann Shaw, Susan Wallace and Connie Davenport; Fran Wielin has also joined the board. Incorporation as a 501 (c) (3) non-profit followed. Sherry and Fran attended the National Gathering of the Village to Village Network in Washington DC in September 2014 and were inspired by the stories of the many diverse communities who created Villages, all different, to fit their communities' needs. PVP Village is partnering with Peninsula Seniors and using their office space. Other sponsors are HELP, Marymount CA University, and AAUW PVP.

A logo was created and a website established, bank accounts set up, liability insurance arranged, charter Members and Donors enrolled, and work has continued to the point where Palos Verdes Peninsula Village has hired an Executive Director and will open the doors to members needing services and volunteers to fill them in late January of 2016. Generous donations have made this possible.
