Membership Dues Update

The national AAUW Board of Directors voted in June 2017 to enact the first dues change in almost a decade. Effective March 16, 2018 national dues will increase from \$49 to \$59.

National dues help to sustain and grow AAUW'S work and programs that advance equity for women and girls.

When it's time to renew our PVP Branch memberships for 2018-2019, the total amount for regular members will be <u>\$101</u>. This includes the \$59 for National, \$20 for CA State AAUW and \$22 for our PVP Branch fees.

Life members will still pay \$42 and dual member fees will remain at \$20.

Highlighting an Exceptional Branch Member – Anne Destabelle

Congratulations to Anne Destabelle and her Pennyroyal Players for being awarded the City of Torrance's Cultural Arts Commission 2017 Excellence in Arts Award for Music. This award recognizes individuals, groups, and corporations who make outstanding contributions to the arts. The Award was presented at a ceremony held at the Torrance Civic Center in October.

Our AAUW/PVP Branch has many interesting and accomplished members and Anne is certainly one of them! Since retiring from two long careers, first in Children's Dependency Services and then in Contract Negotiation at Hughes Electronics, Anne has had more time to dedicate to her lifelong love of the Arts.

Anne created and leads the Pennyroyal Players. The Players donate all proceeds of their performances and to date, they have performed over 1,000 times since inception in 2003 and have given away over \$130,000 to charities, including AAUW's Tech Trek scholarships, Los Cancioneros music scholarships, PTA Costume Closet, PVPUSD elementary school music, Little Fish Theatre, Warner Grand Theatre, Wayfarers Chapel and Liz Cantine's Ready, Willing and Able dance troupe for disabled students.

Anne sings first soprano with Los Cancioneros Master Chorale. She organizes and directs the LC Master Chorale Ensembles, which sing throughout the year at various events to raise major funds for their annual music scholarship competition. She also sang with the prestigious LA Vocal Core, an elite choral group which won awards throughout the South Bay during its existence. Anne can be found giving a piano concert every Thursday afternoon at Torrance Memorial Hospital. She was honored as Legend of the Year for the Volunteer Center's Affinity Group in 2011.



VOTING MADE EASIER - UPDATE ON LA COUNTY'S NEW VOTING PLANS

Los Angeles County is developing a new voting system for all registered voters. The focus is to create a voting experience that is easy to use and is accessible to all voters. The project is called Voting Solutions for All People – VSAP. It addresses issues related to age, language, disability, and location, to give voters an independent voting experience that is easy and convenient.

The new system will comply with a new state law, the California Voting Rights Act (SB 450). This law incorporates some practices that have been used successfully in Oregon and Colorado. Under this law every registered voter would receive a ballot by mail. They could mail in their ballot or take it to a secure drop box. Or they could go to a vote center to either submit the completed ballot or surrender the unused ballot and vote at the vote center. A system of accessible vote centers would replace the current local polling places. A voter could vote at any vote center in the County. The law also requires an extended 11-day voting period – not just one day. The conversion to this new voting system is to be completed statewide by 2024.

Five counties in California will be using the new system in 2018 – Madera, Napa, Nevada, Sacramento, and San Mateo. Other counties may choose to use parts of the system as they approach full conversion in 2024.

Los Angeles County will not convert to the new system until 2024. Ramping up to that time, throughout 2018, LA County will conduct information sessions to educate voters on the system that will be coming. The Registrar will also be researching locations for vote centers and will be seeking public input on possible locations. During 2019, the Registrar Recorder will conduct a mock election to test elements of the new system. In 2020, some parts of the new system will be in place for the primary and November elections – vote centers, drop boxes, extended voting period.

In addition to its work to revise the voting experience, Los Angeles County has worked for several years on the development of a voting mechanism to replace Ink-A-Vote. The new ballot marking device incorporates a touch screen and issues a paper ballot printed with the choices the voter makes on the touch screen. There are many adjustments that can be made to the ballot marking device to meet the needs of the voter. The device is being tested by the Registrar Recorder. It will not be ready for use in the 2018 election.
