It's time to vote on AAUW state and national items. Here's what you will be voting on:

AAUW California Vote April 16 – May 7

On April 16, each member with a valid email address on file received an email message containing a personal invitation to vote that includes a link to the ballot.

AAUW National Vote April 7 - May 17

Election of members to the National Board

Approval of proposed Public Policy Priorities for 2021-2012

Approval of proposed bylaw changes (2/3 vote)

- removal of degree requirement for membership
- changes in student membership category

The AAUW Board of Directors has joined the AAUW Board in support of a "yes" vote on the bylaws change to remove the degree requirement for membership in AAUW. The Board stated that AAUW survived for over 130 years because it has been willing to change as the world has changed. Now it is time for AAUW to adjust and thrive with the changing times.

#### AAUW CA LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

The Public Policy Committee has completed its review of the bills for this legislative season, and the 2020-21 <u>Bill Tracker</u> can now be found on the website under Public Policy/Legislative Advocacy/Bill Tracking. You can see which bills AAUW CA is working on and check their status.

#### **CHANGING COVID GUIDELINES**



### THANKS FOR A SUCCESSFUL LOBBY DAY!

AAUW California's first attempt at a virtual Lobby Day with the California Legislature presented many challenges: contacting dozens of legislators' offices, registering and communicating with participating members, analyzing legislation to discuss. The Public Policy Team made it happen successfully!

First we thank our lobbyist, Kathy Van Osten who, with help from her assistant Jennifer, made all the appointments with legislators. Kathy also arranged for our key opening speakers, Assembly Member Christina Garcia, Chair of the Women's Legislative Caucus, and Assembly Majority Leader Eloise Reyes, author of AB 92, which we are co-sponsoring. These two prominent legislators were empowering and it was also significant for them to learn about AAUW and our Public Policy Priorities.

After the opening session, 30 teams of 3 or 4 AAUW members connected with individual legislators or their staff. Thanks to our Team Leaders who prepared their teams for their meetings! In these meetings, members communicated information about AAUW CA, their branches and also the three bills which are high priority for AAUW in the current session.

AB 92 Assembly Member Reyes *Child Care Family Fees* SB 62 Senator Durazo *Garment Worker Protection Act* AB 373 Assembly Member Min *Consumer Debt: Economic Abuse* 

The results of these meetings are important in several ways. Sixty legislators or their staff now know about AAUW and our commitment to improve the lives of women and girls in California. They'll remember us when we contact them again as our bills move through the legislative process. Several legislative staffers asked for more information about becoming members! Co-Chairs Kathi Harper and Sue Miller met with members of Governor Newsom's staff who are influential in assisting the Governor in his decisions about signing or vetoing bills, and with Senate President Pro Tem Toni Atkins staff. Kathi and Sue also met with Assembly Member Reyes who is ecstatic that we are co-sponsoring AB 92! She made a point of telling us that AAUW IS very well known and respected in Sacramento! All of this will enable our lobbyist to better connect with legislators as our bills move through the legislative process from now through September.

Thanks to all of you who participated! Hopefully we can do this in person in 2022!

### PVP Tech Trek Status Update

The Tech Trek Committee completed the selection process for the 2021 7<sup>th</sup> grade girls. We scheduled Zoom interviews for the students nominated by the teachers at Wilmington and Dana Middle Schools this year. The process was different from prior years, but our Tech Trek volunteers were impressed by all the girls they spoke to. We now have 17 girls ready to receive their registration forms this weekend. In addition to the 2021 girls, six of the girls selected in 2020 signed up to attend the 2021 Virtual Tech Trek camp this summer. We're so grateful that California Tech Trek is able to keep the Tech Trek mission going by offering a virtual STEM experience to girls interested in exploring more about these fields.

I want to again thank those of you who have already signed up for camp volunteer positions and urge those of you have not done so to consider giving your time to making these camps a rewarding experience. While the morning core robotics class requires volunteers to work all 5 days of the camp week, the afternoon and evening workshops do not. There are two 90 minute afternoon workshops Monday – Thursday. Not all the evening workshops have been identified, but there should be two-four. So, you can volunteer for the days and times that work for you. It's preferable that you work your selected workshops all three camp weeks, but it's not required. I like the idea of a lot of our members volunteering for a couple days each so more members get to participate and learn more about Tech Trek. But then, we do need a lot of adult coaches!

#### VIRTUAL CONFERENCE WILL BE HELD ON MAY 25-26, 2021

We are so excited! AAUW and MCU are having seven women attend the conference this year. This includes three of our finalists from 2019--Melissa Olson, Jocelyn Arevalo-Ralios, and Payton Sprouse plus Hannah White and Emily Phoeuth -- two of the runner ups. Additionally, we included two members of the MCU student government association--Silvia Jauregui and Kasandra Norien.

These conferences are always an amazing experience for these young women who are introduced to fabulous key note speakers, significant workshops and important networking of their peers and mentors.

The AAUW and Marymount California University partnership has now been in existence for eight years and continues to meet our AAUW Mission Statement.

### **Intimate Partner Violence**

At our AAUW/PVP Branch Meeting on March 8<sup>th</sup>, Nancy Rayner provided an update on *Domestic Violence during COVID*. Although Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) encompasses LGBTQ and a wide range of abuse categories, the most common occurrence is violence committed by men against women. Abuse may be physical, mental, or reproductive/sexual. One in three women experience IVP; one in four women experience *severe* IVP, requiring medical treatment or hospitalization.

With IVP already a national concern, COVID-19 provided a 'Perfect Storm' for IVP victims. COVID-19 mandates resulted in victim quarantine with the abuser, who is already frustrated, stressed, and seeking control over something/someone. Friends and others who could help were often unable to due to social distancing regulations. Victims feared going to a shelter and exposing themselves and their children to the virus. Many shelters experienced closures, cutbacks and reduced capacities. Closing of courts and cutbacks made getting orders of protection more difficult or impossible.

Calls to the National Domestic Violence Hotline increased by 17 - 19%; calls to the L.A. County Hotline more than doubled over the past year. In many cases, IVP victims were forced to choose between weathering the abuse and enduring the effects of more severe violence or seeking medical help/support services and exposing themselves and their children to contracting COVID.

To successfully escape such an environment, a person needs a window of opportunity, a safe place to go, money to sustain themselves and any dependents, and a safety protocol in place. If you know such a victim, it is important to:

be supportive and believe her provide her with an opportunity to talk about it check in with her frequently be able to provide information about hotlines and local shelters

If you are in a position to take her in, be sure she is aware that is a possibility for her if needed.

COVID-19 didn't cause Intimate Partner Violence, but mandates to address it have certainly exacerbated the problem worldwide. For many victims, this experience has made them realize that they must leave the environment. We, as a society, must be ready to help them.
