SUPREME COURT RULINGS

• Student Loans

The Supreme Court has ruled that the Biden administration overstepped its authority in announcing the plan to cancel up to \$400 billion in student loans. The vote was 6 to 3. The Biden administration had estimated that as many as 43 million Americans would have benefitted from the loan forgiveness program.

Student-loan repayments were originally put on hold as part of the response to the Covid 19 pandemic. With that hold expiring, Biden announced the plan to cancel some loans.

In the light of the ruling by the Court, new plans are being developed by the Biden administration to address Student Loan forgiveness. AAUW supports government assistance for student debt.

•Affirmative Action

The American Association of University Women has condemned the Supreme Court decision to eliminate the consideration of race in admission to colleges and universities.

AAUW noted that institutions of higher education are pathways to economic security and positions of power in our country. Affirmative action policies have been a critical part of ensuring racial and gender equity and providing redress for past gender, racial, and ethnic discrimination in higher education. They have led to <u>an increased number</u> of women and black and brown people in a range of high-paying professions, including STEM fields.

AAUW remains committed to ensuring women and communities of color have equal access to quality education at all levels to guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse and inclusive society.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION

The Paycheck Fairness Act would update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act to ensure that it provides robust protection against sex-based pay discrimination. Among other provisions, the Paycheck Fairness Act would ensure pay disparities exist only for legitimate, job-related reasons. It would improve research on the gender pay gap, which can help identify, correct, and eliminate illegal wage disparities. The Paycheck Fairness Act would also allow workers to discuss or inquire about their wages free from retaliation, with common-sense exceptions.

AAUW has called on the membership to advocate for the passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act.




