Lobby Days 2024 - Save the Date!

Mark your calendars! AAUW California will hold our 2024 Lobby Days event on April 2 and 3, 2024. An interest survey including a registration form will arrive in your inbox mid-January. Please be sure to complete and return the form to be added to the communications list for the event.

We encourage all AAUW California members to participate in this act of advocacy that is essential for achievement of our legislative priorities. In addition to our members, we plan to invite college students to join the event. Their participation will enable us to reach more legislative offices, and we hope that this introduction to our organization will inspire these advocacy-minded young people who share our values to join AAUW.

Starting in January, our committee will evaluate new bills introduced in the state legislature which are aligned with our Public Policy Priorities: Economic Security for All Women, Equal Access to Quality Public Education for All Students, Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society, and Increased Representation of Women in Leadership Roles. In early March, our committee will meet to discuss our evaluations and select 30-35 bills for our 2024 Legislative Agenda that best represent our priorities. We will also choose the top 3 bills to advocate for during Lobby Days.

Lobby Days 2024 is scheduled to take place when the legislature returns to session after their Easter break, and will span two days to provide flexibility so that we can secure as many meetings as possible. We are planning a hybrid event with meetings scheduled virtually over Zoom as well as in-person at the Capitol. Members who live in and around Sacramento will have the option to participate in person. Legislative offices are equally willing to meet virtually or in person, and the virtual option makes it easier for AAUW members around the state to participate.

Our AAUW California Legislative Advocate will schedule meetings with the legislative offices. The committee will assemble teams of AAUW members and college students, matching them with Assembly and Senate districts. Training materials on the bills and the event will be posted on the state website in mid-March, and a mandatory training webinar will be held on March 25, 2024.

If you have participated in Lobby Days in the past, we would love to hear your feedback on what worked and what didn't. Please send your comments to publicpolicy@aauw-ca.org.

Lobby Days is a wonderful opportunity to meet with your legislators and advocate for legislation to promote gender equity and improve the lives of women and girls. We hope that you will join us in this important activity to advance our values.

Tech Trek is in contact with our two usual schools, Richard Henry Dana Middle School, and Wilmington Middle School. Prior to COVID, Kathy Ford had reached out to two other local schools, but we will not be pursuing that for 2024. There have been a lot of changes, including the use of Camp Docs and juggling appropriate and effective communication between all parties involved. We will be giving AAUW CA our preliminary estimate of campers, will seek nominations from the two schools, review the applications and consider interviews in the coming weeks.

Some of our goals for the year are as follows:

- •Encourage more independence from the girls themselves. As is typical for their age, there was a poor response rate to emails and texts last year, requiring significant and repeated attempts to get them to respond. We intend to emphasize that turning things in on time is a great way to show your interest and enthusiasm, along with providing support for this process.
- •We are going to create a "continuity binder" so that the committee has a recipe for executing Tech Trek for PVP, including job descriptions, expense records, talking points, supplies, and suggestions. We would benefit from clarifying and detailing committee responsibilities so that the workload is spread out a bit more, making sustainability of Tech Trek PVP more likely.
- •We are focusing on quality not quantity, doing what we do well, without a heavy fundraising demand. We do not raise funds in a similar manner to other branches, though we do quite well with the funds from donations and programs such as Readers Theatre. We will likely send less campers this year but anticipate it will be a fantastic experience for those that attend.

As always, we happily accept donations or even leads for sources of funding for this worthy project.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day – January 15, 2024

Martin Luther King day is a federal holiday in the United States that honors the civil rights leader and activist, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. It is observed on the third Monday of January each year.

Martin Luther King Day commemorates the birthday of American civil rights leader Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and celebrates his life, achievements and legacy. King was hugely influential in the American Civil Rights Movement and was the chief spokesperson of non-violent activism in the struggle for the end of racial discrimination under US law.

Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated in 1968. The federal holiday in King's honor was created in 1983, during the presidency of Ronald Reagan, and first observed in January 1986.

In recent years it is increasingly seen to be a 'Day of Service' when Americans are encouraged to volunteer to help others less fortunate than themselves. The 2024 MLK Day theme is "Living the Dream: It Starts With Me - Spreading Hope, Courage and Unity".

Ms. Cho is a sophomore at Mira Costa High School in Redondo Beach, a member of the Youth Advisory Council at the Beach Cities Health District (BCHD), and the lead of BCHD's Youth Health and Safety Committee. The Committee's mandate is to spread awareness of social media safety.

Ms. Cho was honored at the first Girl's Leading Change celebration at the White House hosted by First Lady Jill Biden on the 2023 International Day of the Girl. She is one of 13 young women from across the nation to receive this honor.

Our speaker will discuss her work which focuses on combatting online harassment and abuse and the harm it poses to youth and teens. In conjunction with her talk, she will present a documentary that she produced about the issue of online harassment and mental health.

Mona Cho opts to use her film as a tool to promote online safety and is a call for change.

This meeting should be of particular interest to our TTAG students and we welcome their attendance.
