

AAUW CA Advocates for its Priorities with the Legislature

This year's Lobby Days event, held on April 2nd and 3rd, was exciting and action-packed. 140 women on 43 teams from 63 AAUW California branches met with 39 Assembly offices and 27 Senate offices. Eleven meetings took place in person in Sacramento, 55 meetings took place via Zoom, and the majority took place without a hitch.

While most meetings were conducted with legislative staff, we were able to hold eight meetings with the members themselves - five Assemblymembers and three Senators. We were not able to get a meeting for Zoom Team 7 with Assemblymember Hart, but they did even better when one of their members, Judy Frost from the Santa Maria branch, joined Assemblymember Hart on a hike and lobbied him on the hiking trail.

We were happy to learn that our organization was known to many of the legislative staff and legislators with whom our members met. Some staff had looked up our website prior to meeting and were impressed with programs such as Tech Trek and Gov Trek. Most were supportive of advancing women's equity.

The reception of our "Top 3" bills - AB 2843, AB 2326 and AB 2099 – was generally favorable. The offices were more familiar with the first two, both of which are sponsored by AAUW California. AB 2099 was new to them. You can find more information on these and all the bills we are supporting here: Bill Tracking Report - 2024 Legislative Session.

In short, AB 2843 eliminates cost sharing, including deductibles, from being imposed on any rape survivor seeking medical treatment following a rape. Insurers will be required to cover the full cost of medical care. AB 2326 requires the chancellors or presidents from the University of California (UC), the California State University (CSU), and the California Community Colleges, to provide an annual report publicly and orally to the Assembly and Senate Subcommittees on Education Finance on each institution's compliance with Title IX, including sexual assault. AB 2099 would make it possible for the D.A. to file a felony charge for sharing personal information or images of reproductive health care providers or patients, including on the internet, with the intent of causing them harm, if the posting and subsequent action results in bodily injury.

During our Lobby Days event, we were able to get our message across to those who make our laws and to highlight AAUW, our mission, accomplishments and the benefits we bring to our communities throughout California. It was an empowering exercise in advocacy and for those of you who participated, AAUW California thanks you!

PUBLIC POLICY: Title IX Update

On Friday, April 19, 2024, the Biden Administration released long-awaited guidance on the application and administration of Title IX. The rule changes (1) rework Trump Administration guidance on the handling of campus sexual assault, providing expanded protections for survivors; and (2) expand Title IX protections against sex/gender-based harassment and discrimination to protect members of the LGBTQ+ community. Expansion of rights to the LGBTQ+ community via Title IX aligns this federal law with current interpretation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, which prohibits workplace discrimination on the basis of sex/gender. **AAUW national serves in a gender equity coalition supporting these changes.** Stay tuned! More information on this will be coming.

The selection process prioritized girls who submitted their documents before the deadline and either attended all of the gatherings or responded promptly to all communication. The girls were aware of these standards from the beginning and support was readily available.

The Tech Trek committee was on hand to do the set-up, sign-ins and assist with the activities. The girls participated in an ice breaker and a puzzle game to help get to know and work with students from other schools. We talked with the girls and coached them that as role models of our branch they should make sure that no girl felt excluded. Most of the girls have already been notified of their core class subject material. Their reactions were priceless from squealing and jumping up and down, to looking a bit stunned. We walked the girls around and encouraged them to introduce themselves to other girls who are attending the same camp and core specialty. Some of the core specialties are Anatomy, Chemistry, Crime Scene Investigation, Robotics/Coding, and Neurology.

TTAG members Sarah Solares and our very own 2023 camper, Yajaira Ledesma, spoke to the parents as did Sarah's mother. The content was also repeated in Spanish. These two TTAG girls were tremendously poised and confident, exhibiting the benefits of Tech Trek. We look forward to you meeting the 2024 campers at Celebrate Tech Trek on **August 18**th. 

DEI Corner: What is Juneteenth?

In June, the nation celebrated Juneteenth.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, which declared a formal end to slavery in the United States. However, change was not instant after the proclamation. Nearly two and a half years later, on June 19th, 1865, the enslaved African Americans of Galveston, Texas got the news by way of the Union army troops that freedom had come at last.

The next year, the people of Galveston commemorated that day as Juneteenth, a celebration of freedom. Since then, it's been observed in communities and states as a holiday, but officially recognized as a federal holiday in 2021.

Why is the holiday called Juneteenth? The name blends the month and the day this news reached the people of Galveston: "June" plus "nineteenth" is Juneteenth.

Juneteenth isn't just about celebrating a day or a single historical event – it's a celebration of freedom, resilience, community and the possibilities of good things to come.

Drum Barracks Civil War Museum

"I (or my kids) studied California history in 4th grade, but I never heard about this!" was the common refrain while AAUW members explored the War Drum Barracks, a hidden historical gem in Wilmington. The 150+ year old house, built as a duplex, housed senior officers during the Civil War. Interestingly, the components of the house were shipped from the east coast. The house and stone from the ammunition magazine are all that remain of the multiple structures and parade ground, which covered blocks of current Wilmington. Among other things, we learned...

Southern California was a hotbed of Southern sympathizers

Camp Drum was named after Colonel Richard Drum, Assistant Adjutant General of the Army's Department of the Pacific

The army used camels as part of their west coast operations

Soldiers wore wool uniforms year-round and carried over 50 pounds of gear

The land was donated by Phineas Banning (Father of the Port of Los Angeles), who built a railroad spur to the wharf

Officers could enjoy alcohol and gambling, which were off-limits to enlisted men.

After the military left, Banning and Benjamin Wilson (first mayor of Los Angeles) started a Methodist College on the site, the forerunner to USC
